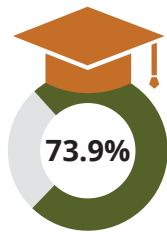

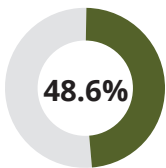
Our 572 students at a glance:



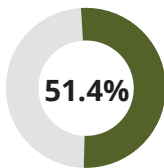
4-year graduation rate, Class of 2016

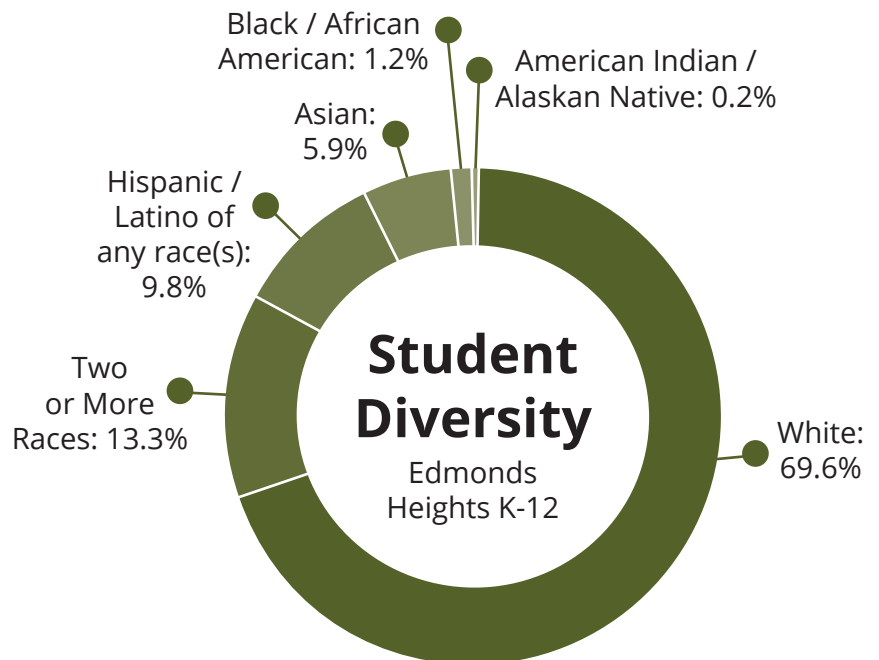


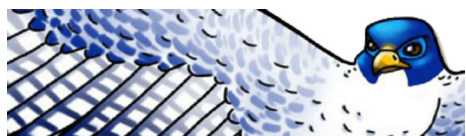

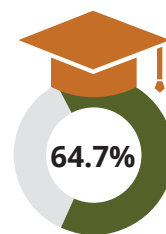
