Your Bond and Levy Dollars at Work

Our Capital Projects team leveraged the 2014 voter-approved Capital Construction Bond in order to accomplish more than the original identified needs. They earned a prestigious general contractor/construction manager (GC/CM) agency approval from the state that allowed collaboration between architectural firms and construction firms early in a project's process. This has led to more efficient buildings and savings in time and labor. They partnered with local organizations to secure funds for expanding projects, used funds from the sale and/or lease of district property and spent a portion of the 2016 voter-approved Technology/ Capital Levy on improvements large and small. All of these funds may only be used for the purpose in which they were designated. Here are updates on our most recent projects:

Madrona K-8, open since January 2019, is wrapping up final details with site work and landscaping continuing through the summer.

Spruce Elementary, with Phase 1 set to complete this summer, will have a new south wing open to students September 2019. It will include a gym/commons/stage, music room, kitchen, small group rooms, a community room, and more. Design for Phase 2 is underway and will include a new north wing with all new classrooms and a library. Construction may begin once funding becomes available. Learn more at: bit.ly/SpruceSchool

Capital Partnership Projects, using both Capital Projects and community-raised funds, include an outdoor classroom at Seaview Elementary and ga-ga ball pits at several elementary schools (Beverly, Hazelwood, Hilltop, Martha Lake, Seaview, and Westgate). What is ga-ga?

Chromebooks One-to-One Project Update

Funded by the 2016 Technology/Capital Levy

A new initiative, which began last year, offers graduating seniors the opportunity to purchase their Chromebook computers. It is one way the District can equip each graduate with academic skills and tools for life past graduation. Seniors may buy their computers online for \$20 or less depending on need. The program encourages all students to take great care of the Chromebooks they receive at the start of their freshman year.


All high school students are able to keep their Chromebooks over the summer for continued learning and preparation for the next school year. All students have access to a collection of online educational resources throughout the year.

Renewal and Upgrade projects include cameras and access control updates completed at all secondary school sites with primary school updates continuing. This summer, a new baseball field and tennis courts, among other outdoor improvements, will be designed and constructed at Edmonds-Woodway High. Synthetic turf replacement and other site improvements are planned at Lynnwood High and Meadowdale High. In addition, Alderwood Middle will receive two relocatable classrooms for the 2019-20 school year to increase capacity.

Blueprint 2025: Building Brighter Futures, Together

Thank you families, students, staff, and community members for input and feedback during this nine-month process to help define our future!

After more than a dozen meetings, one communitywide town hall, and two surveys, the District is close to finalizing its new strategic plan to guide the District's work over the next several years.

"A heartfelt thank you to steering committee members for helping guide this process and special thanks to all of the people who attended meetings or took the surveys,' Superintendent Kristine McDuffy said. "This work is a reflection of our community's values and the direction we want to take our district into the future."

The plan focuses on three pillars:

- Student, Family, and **Community Engagement**
- Leadership
- Teaching and Learning



The draft plan also includes high-level goals that focus on feedback heard from the community about the need for high expectations for all students, student success, building community, equity and access, and building a culture of kindness and global readiness for students. The District is finalizing the exact goals and working on two to three measurements for each of the five goals.

"We want to be aspirational, but we heard from the community how important it is for us to have goals that can be measured and that we can track progress of year over year," McDuffy said. "We want to set a clear path that results in improvements to our schools and continued success for our students and staff."

Edmonds School District launched this process in the fall of 2018. While

the previous strategic direction, Our Commitment, set a tone for the District, Superintendent McDuffy and the leadership team wanted to seek input from the community to develop a plan with specific goals and measurable targets.

In mid-October the District launched a steering committee to help guide the Blueprint 2025 process with the help of Seattle-based consultants Strategies 360. The steering committee reviewed plans and agendas, drafted goals, and helped with outreach.

The District is expected to finalize the plan by July 9 for consideration by the School Board, with a final vote on August 13.

Through the Project Search Program, David has learned what the working world looks like. He plans to continue work full-time at Dunn Lumber, swim in Special Olympics, and travel.




Meadowdale High Sophie Stocker
