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
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Graduates Who Are Ready For Life


Digital Inspiration

Student learning grows with Seesaw — an engaging technology tool

It's all about caterpillars and butterflies this month in Mrs. Roseburg's classroom at Westgate Elementary! The second-grade students are using traditional research methods but with a twist; incorporating new technology that makes learning even more fun and engaging. Mrs. Roseburg has been pioneering the use of Seesaw, a digital portfolio tool, in her classroom for the last three years. Students love using this new technology in their research along with standard books, journal note taking and online research tools, such as Epic and Pebble Go.

Mrs. Roseburg states, "It's like Facebook, but a safer platform. The parent communication piece to this is huge and the engagement from them helps to inspire kids and keeps them accountable."

Students can post images, draw, make labels, video, audio excerpts, voice captions, and add in notes documenting their activities in real-time with their parents and in turn,

they can give immediate feedback on their child's post. Kids light up when their parents engage more in their daily learning experience. Students are also learning a variety of skills in the process: being a responsible digital citizen, increased communication skills, online technical skills, and learning to use multimedia platforms to convey knowledge and learning.

In this class, as the butterflies are emerging from their chrysalises in the back of the room, the students are also growing in their combined love of learning science and technology.

Spruce Elementary (Phase 1)

- Design of full replacement complete through Design Development phase
- Phase 1 construction documents submitted to City of Lynnwood for permit review
- School Board has approved construction, which will commence in Spring 2018

Students will remain on-site during construction of Phase 1.

Madrona School K-8

Total project cost — \$50.5 million Construction started June 2017, school

opens for students in September 2018

- Building structure complete Fully weatherproofed
- Interior finishes are currently being installed
- External landscaping underway School students and staff, Design Team, Contractors, ESD CPO and neighbors participated in two Madrona Garden Parties removing invasive species and prepping area to receive relocated

plants. School remains on-site during construction
