Students Learning Takes Off With Use of Chromebook Computers Pilot program's success leads to plan for districtwide use

Walking into Alderwood Middle School this year you see something exciting happening; all students using their own laptop computers. At the beginning of this school year, each student was issued a Chromebook computer for educational use at school and home. In addition, all students in grades 4-6 at Cedar Valley Community School were issued computers for use at school. The District piloted the Internet-only Chromebooks at these two schools, giving students access to:

- Google Apps for Education accounts which gives students email accounts; and
- Google Drive for word processing, spreadsheets, presentations and file storage.



This is all monitored by the District and provides increased privacy and security than personal Google accounts. Alderwood Middle School teachers are pleased with their experience integrating the Chromebooks into classroom instruction. Plus the students, "they love them," said Angel Ericksen, 7th-grade math teacher. In her class, she uses an application that allows students to compete with each other to solve math problems, increasing student engagement and participation.

Strategic Direction Work Groups and Indicators

So far, the Strategic Direction Work Groups have met seven times. One of their goals was to develop indicators, which is critical to "Each Student Learning, Every Day!" These will be used to monitor and adjust progress from year to year. The indicators have just been finalized

Graduates Who Are Ready for Life

We have Career and College Readiness Specialists at the middle school level and On-Time Graduation Coordinators at the high school level who work together to support students staying in school and completing all graduation requirements. We plan to enhance, monitor and assess our effectiveness as we implement new high school requirements.

Facilities and Enrollment

With the voter-approved 2014 Construction Bond, work is underway across our District to provide students with safe and effective learning environments. With the anticipation of increased state funding for all-day kindergarten and reduced class sizes in grades 1-3, we will be installing 17 new re-locatable classrooms at 12 elementary schools this summer. This is in addition to the school modernization projects, three new school construction projects plus a new Maintenance and Transportation facility. By managing and developing our resources we are able to complete necessary and timely Capital Project work.

Future Kindergartners Welcome!

Registration has begun at neighborhood schools

Children who will be 5-years-old by August 31, 2015 are eligible to begin kindergarten in September. Registration continues through June 30 and then again beginning August 10 at all schools.

Program Options:

- Part-Time Kindergarten: 5 days a week, morning or afternoon session. There is no charge to parents.
- Full-Time Kindergarten: 5 days a week, full school day. At lottery schools tuition waivers may also be available to qualifying families (as funding permits). Non-lottery schools are free of charge.

Required documents to register: certified birth certificate, vaccinations and immunization record, proof of residency (utility bill, lease, or mortgage papers). Please start the process even if you do not have the birth certificate or immunizations.

Sid Carden, an 8th-grade science teacher said special applications allow her to provide students with instant feedback and even to tell, in real time, whether a student is focusing on coursework or not. "I can send a message right away when a student's not paying attention," she said. Eighth-grade world language teacher Lynn Johnston said technical ability varies. "The nice thing is, they all have the same Chromebooks. They sort of bring each other up." In addition, a group of students have been trained as tech leaders and are available to assist other students in class who may be having trouble.

Dan DeJoy, a social studies teacher shared how he is no longer limited by what he can photocopy. With Chromebooks, now a variety of media and information is available to every student instantaneously and content can easily be adjusted to meet the different learning levels of the students. "The staff of Alderwood Middle and I feel incredibly fortunate to belong to a community that values education and recognizes the critical role technology plays in providing a first-class education," Principal Erin Murphy said.

With the voter-approved 2012 Technology/Capital Levy the District originally planned to replace about 2,000 Lenovo Netbooks at a cost of \$1.62 million. At the same price, the District bought 5,400 Chromebooks and left existing Netbooks in classrooms. This significantly increases the student's ability to access technology on a daily basis so they can gain necessary technology skills.

Next year, the district is looking into expanding the Chromebook pilot to get laptops into the hands of every middle school student districtwide for use at school and at home. This is in alignment with our district's Strategic Direction to provide Effective Learning for all Students, Equity of Opportunity and Graduates Who are Ready for Life.


